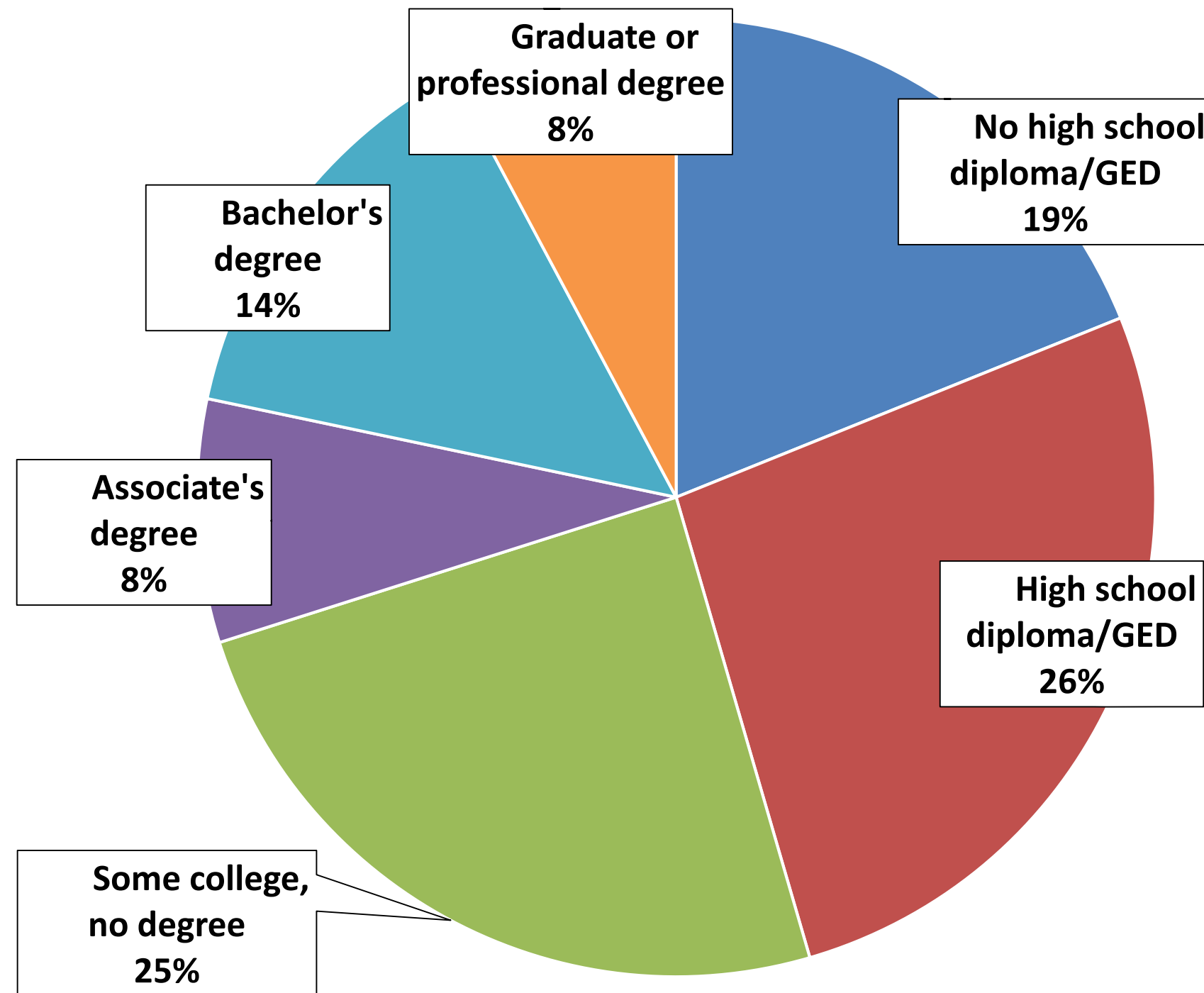

- 1. Of the largest statistical areas in the United States, the Inland Empire ranks 13th largest in terms of population.
- 2. The Inland Empire has the **lowest educational attainment rate** of the 50 largest metropolitan statistical areas.

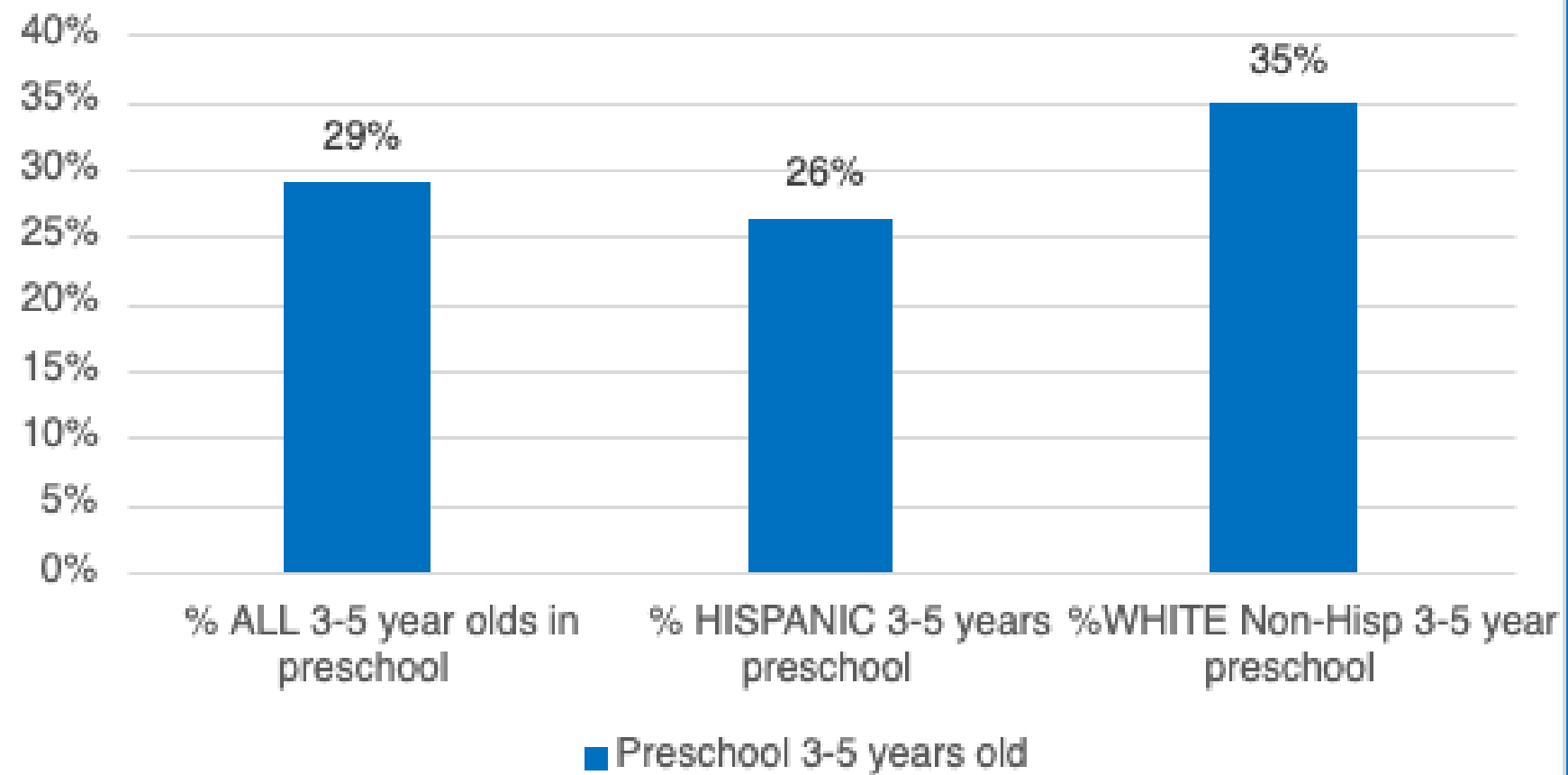

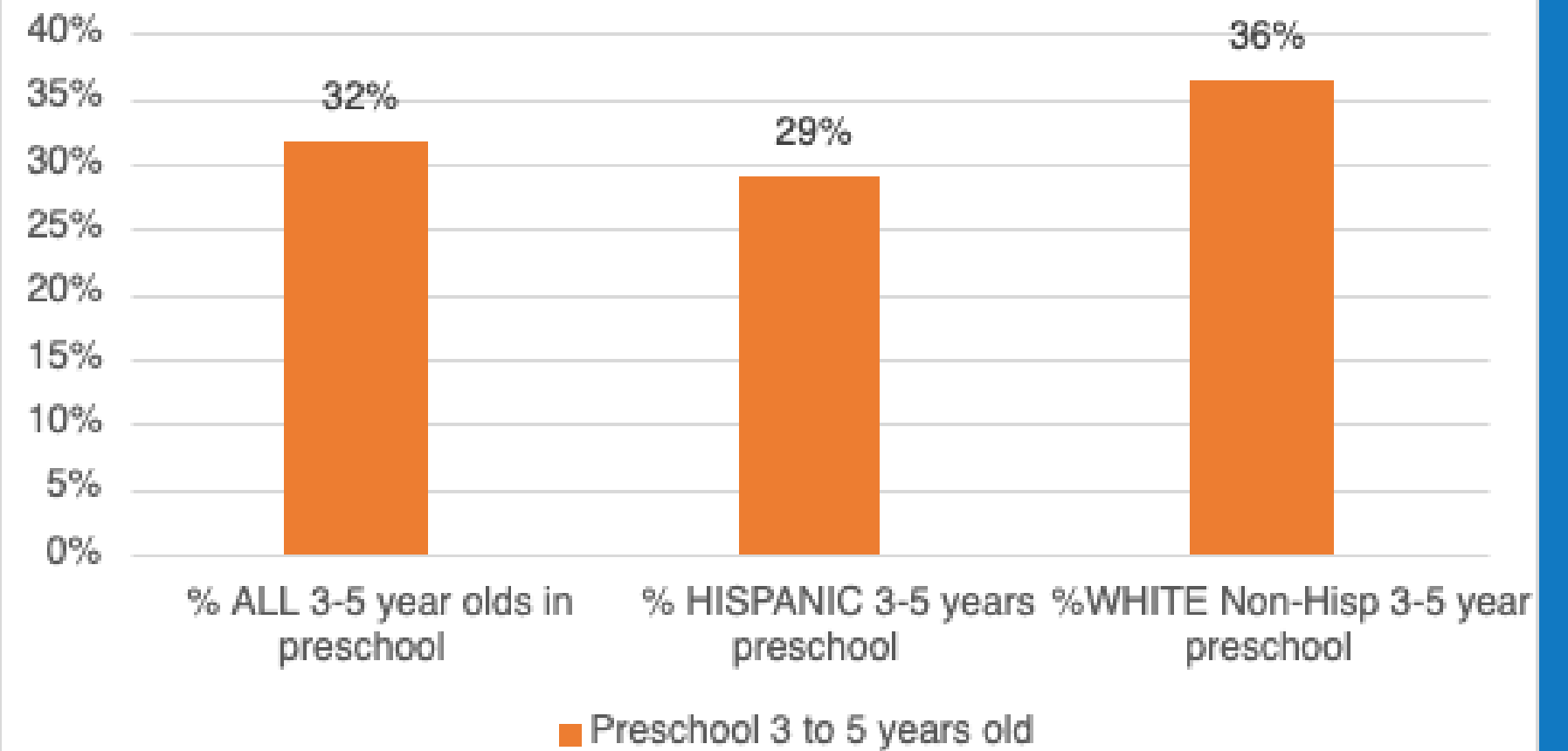
Kindergarten Readiness

Percent of 3 to 5 years old in Preschool 2019

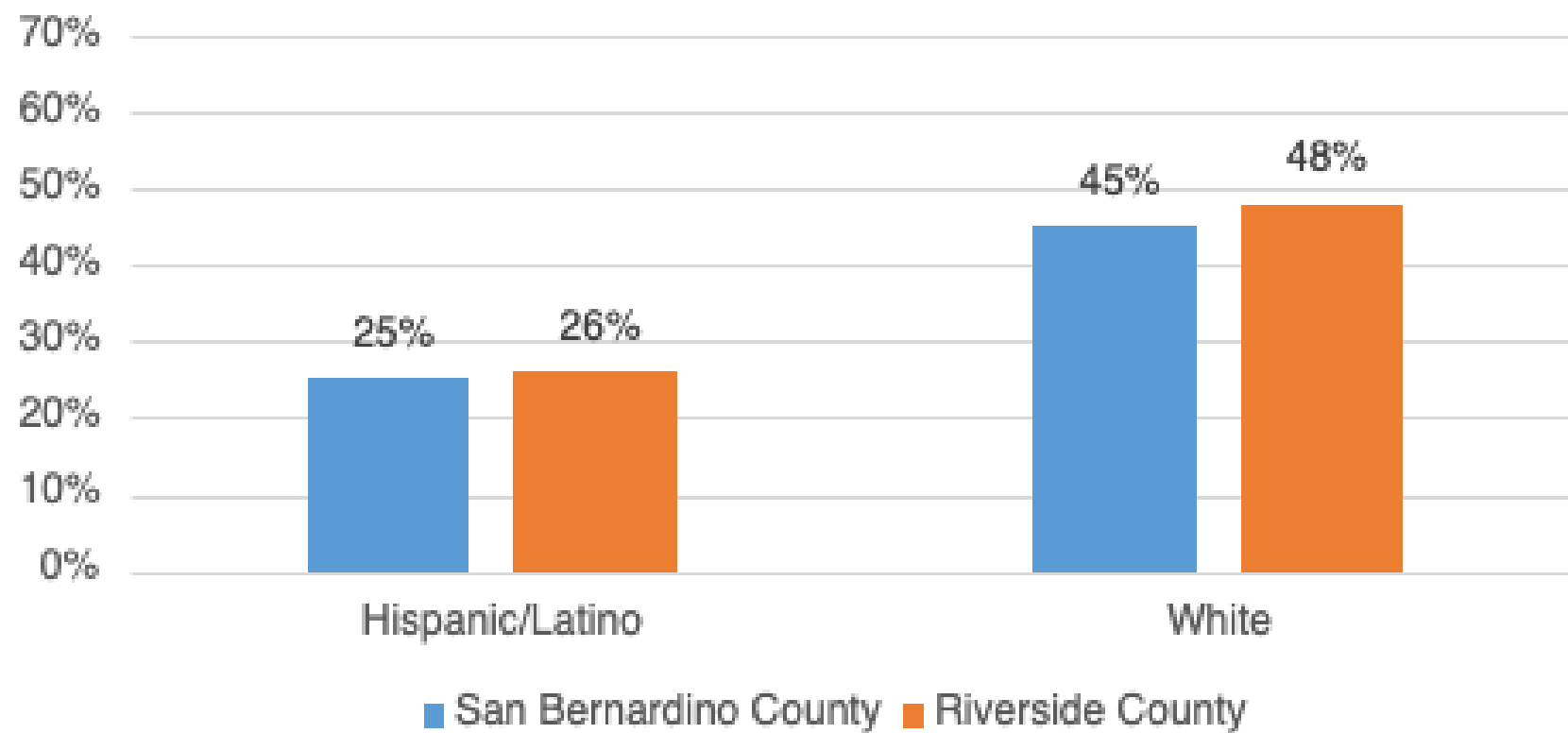




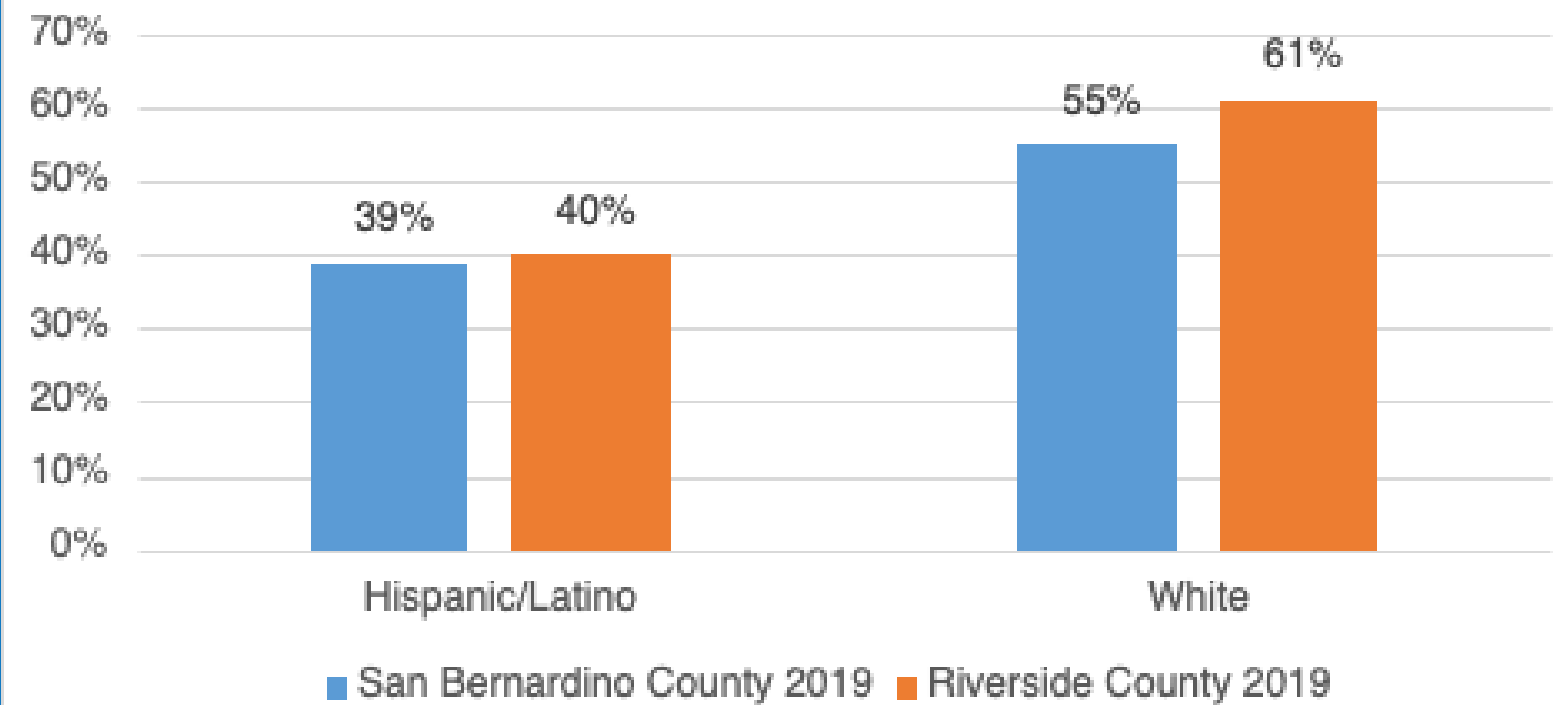
Third Grade Reading

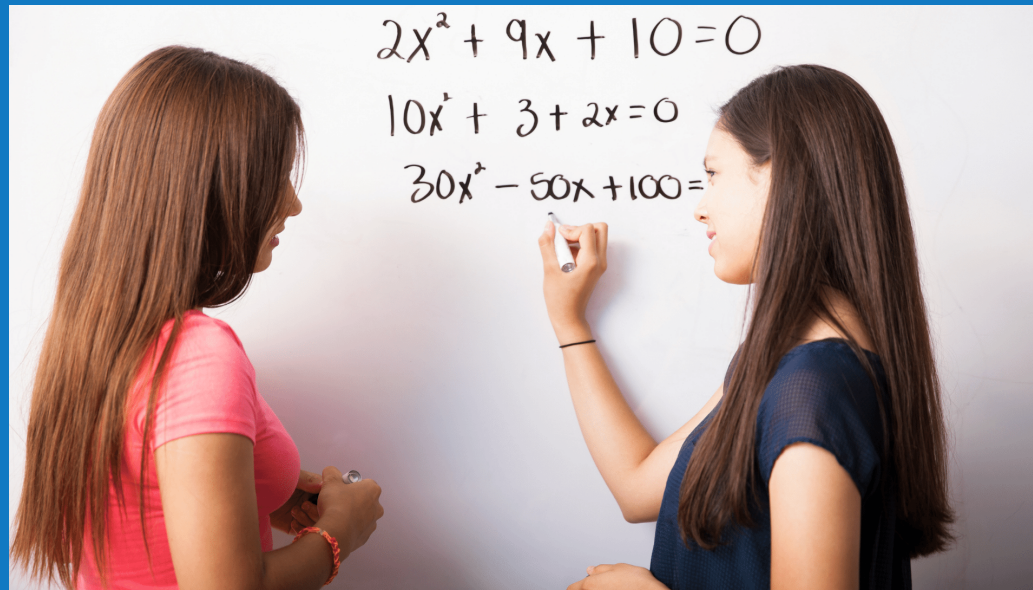

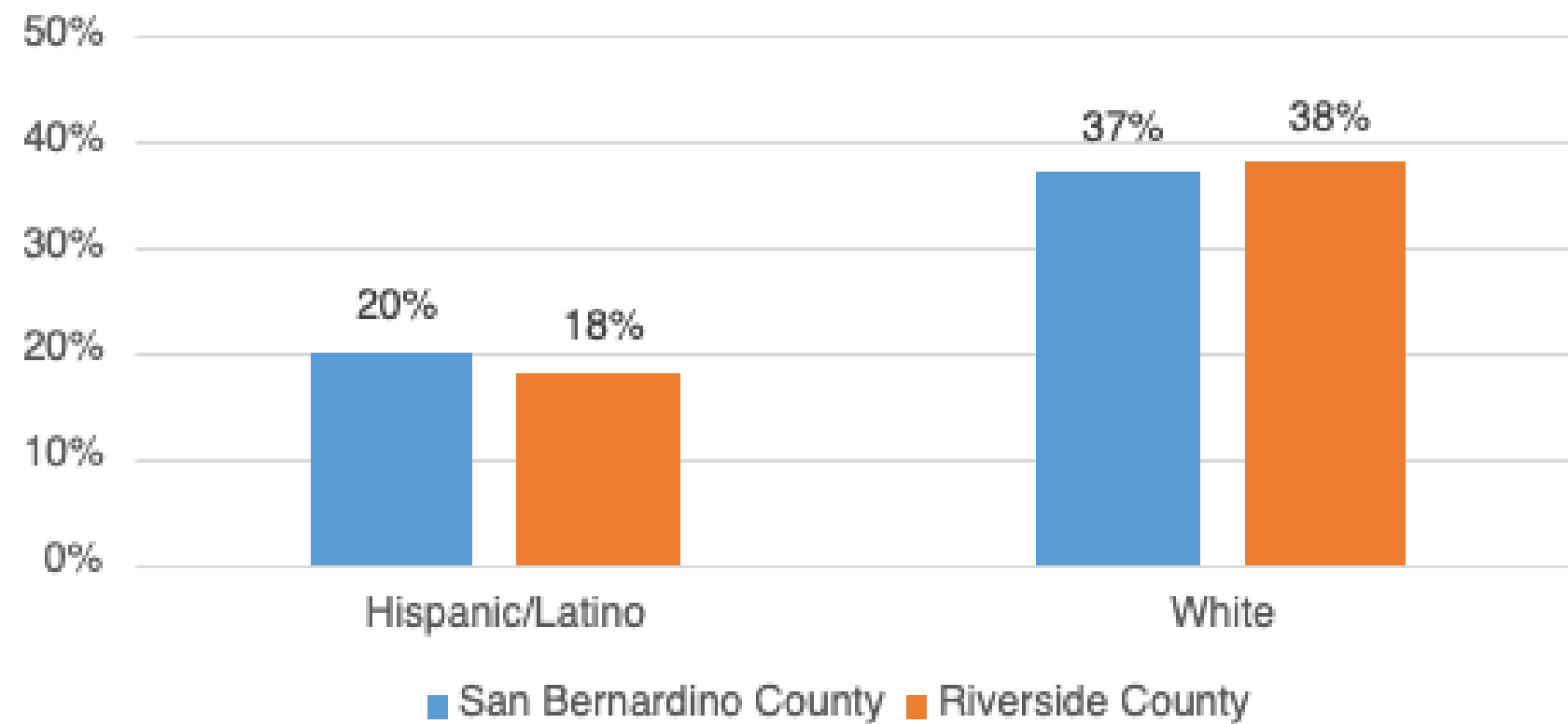




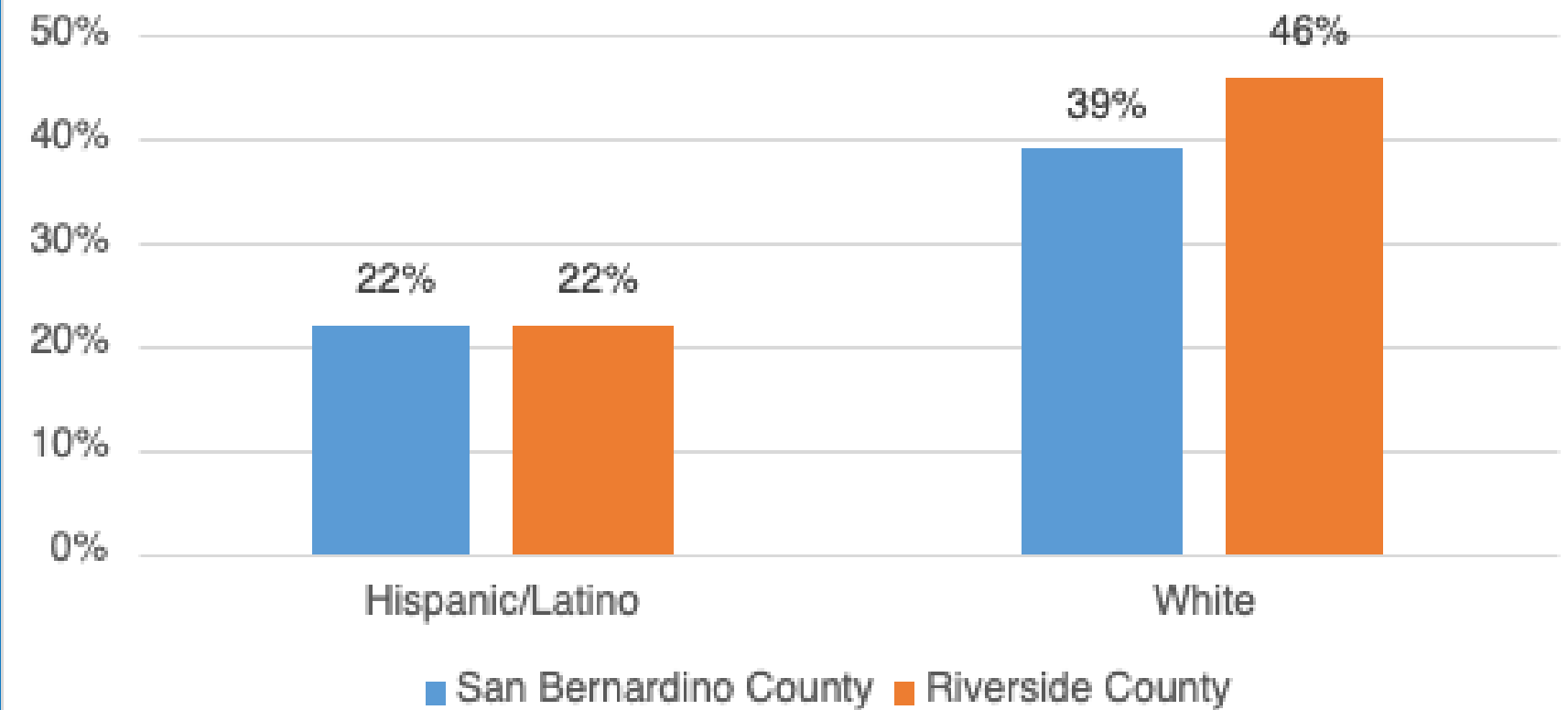
Eighth Grade Math

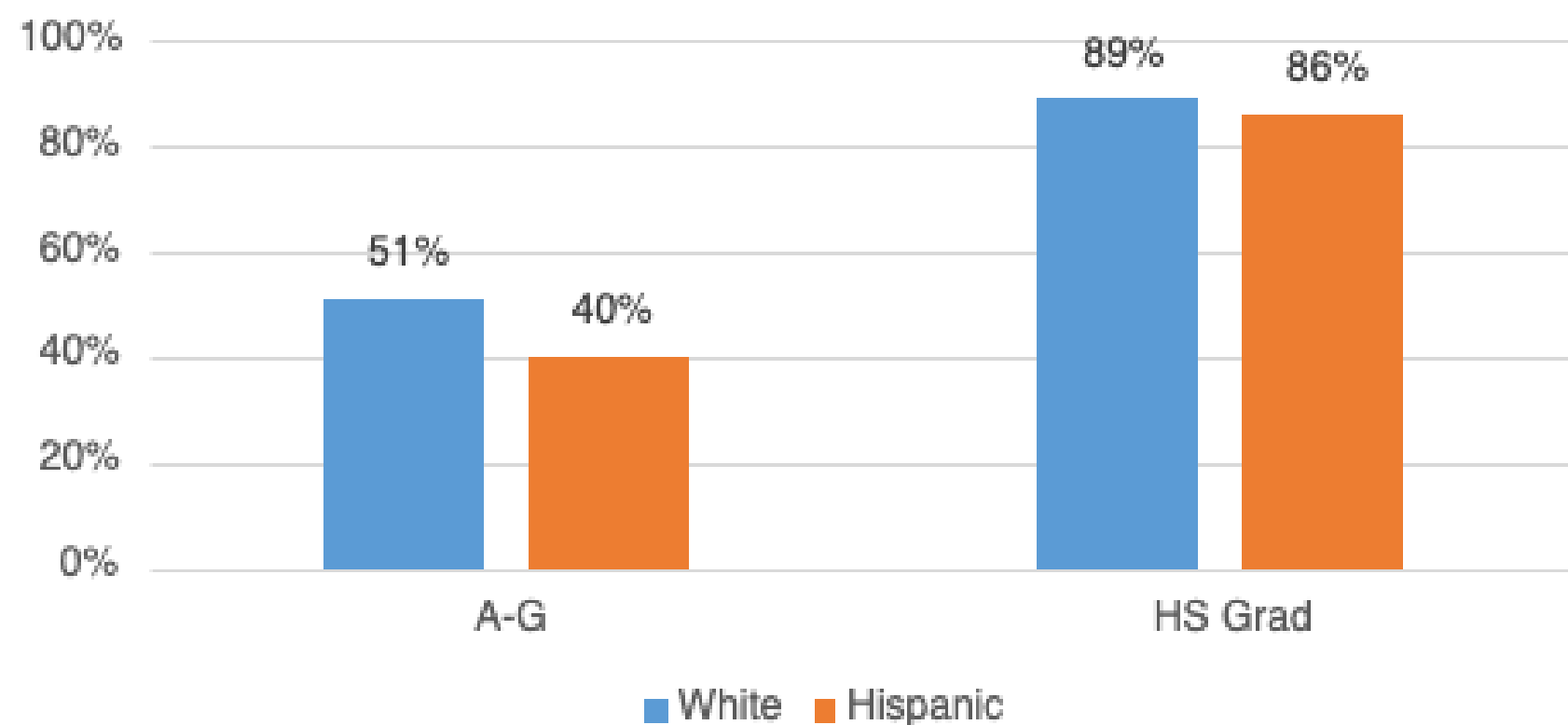

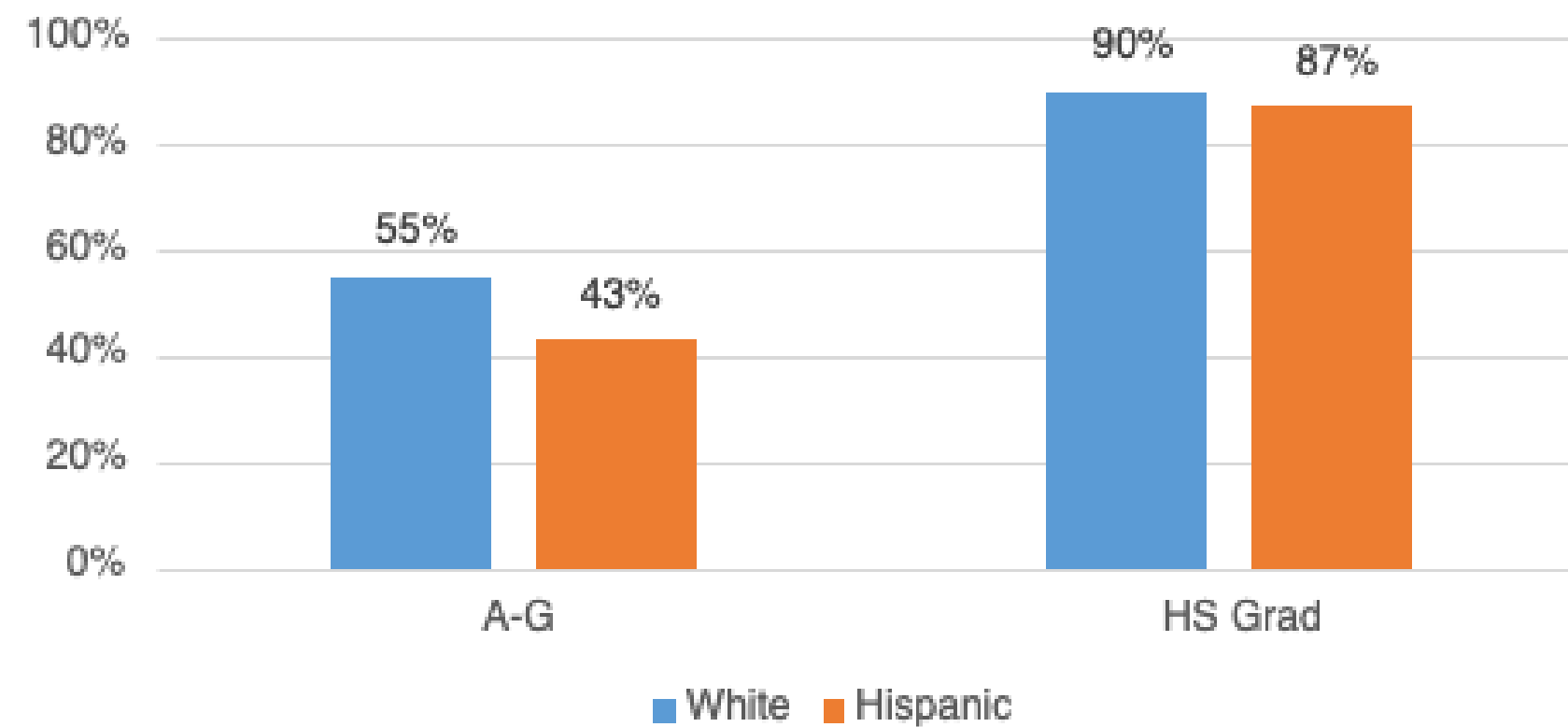
High School Graduation

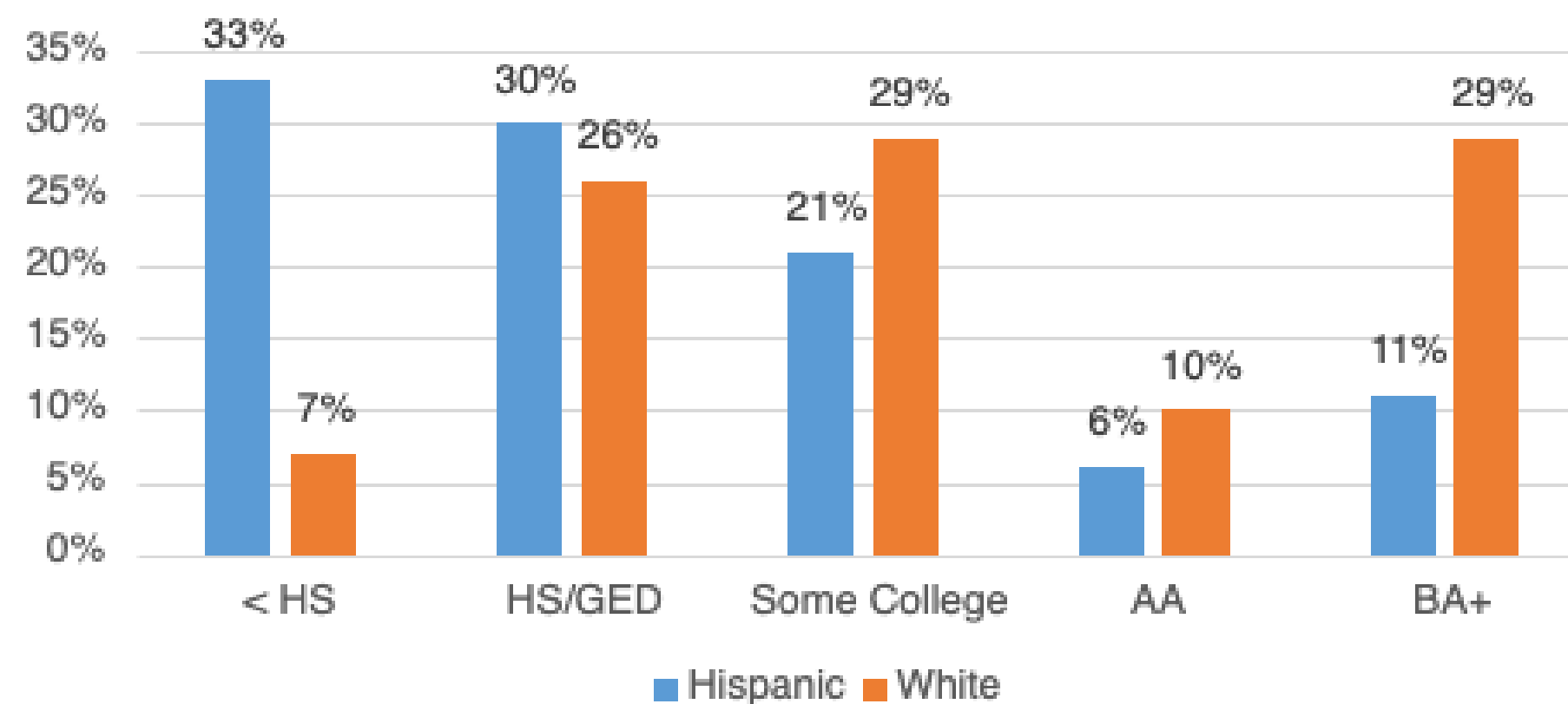


Postsecondary Completion

(Age 25+ years)



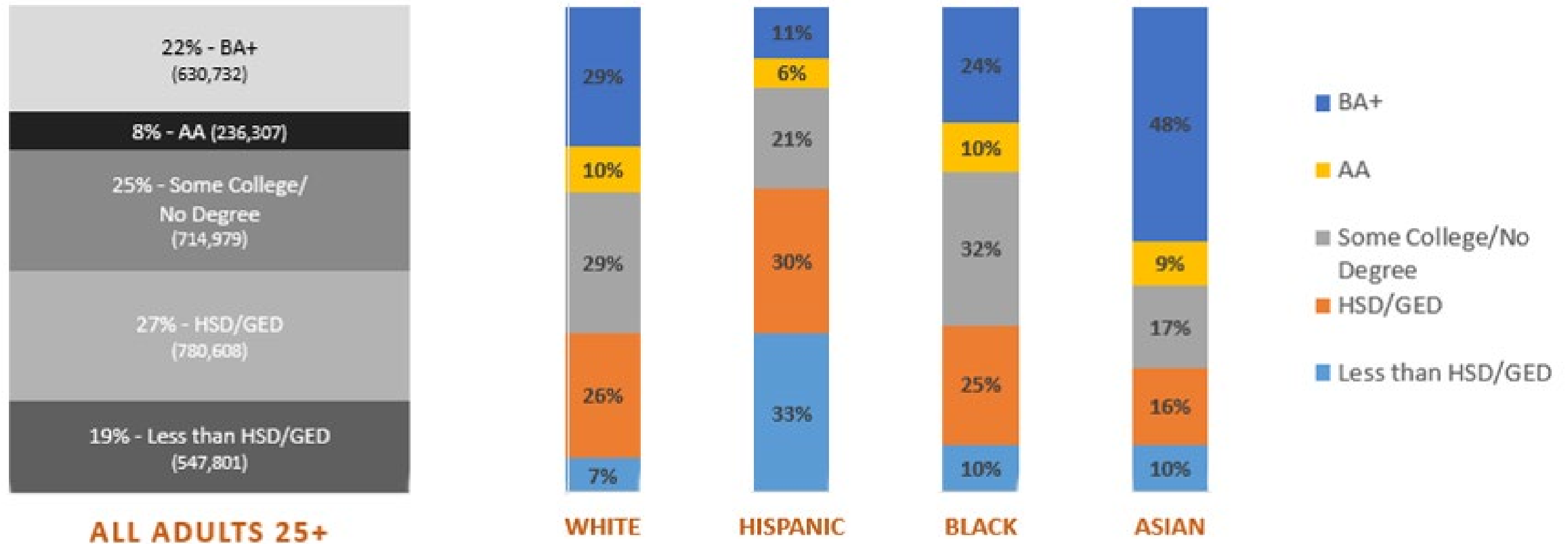
2019 Inland Empire Adults Ages 25+ Educational Attainment

Did you know...

- Only 22% of IE adults ages 25+ have a BA or higher
- 8% achieved an AA as their highest level of completion
- Asians outperform overall IE educational attainment, 48% (BA+) and 9% (AA), respectively
- White BA and AA attainment outpaces IE adults at 29% and 10%, respectively
- Among Hispanics, only 11% and 6% have at least a BA or AA, respectively, as their highest level of education
- Among Blacks, BA+ and AA representation is 24% and 10%, respectively

Studies find the COVID-19 pandemic has led to 13% of students delaying graduation (Aucejo, French, Ugaide, & Zafar, 2020). The impact of COVID-19 on low-income and first-generation student persistence is even more striking, with 55% and 50% delaying graduation, respectively. As a result, this snapshot of IE educational attainment is likely to change considerably in future ACS PUMS data.

Dreamers & DACA

INSTITUTIONAL CHALLENGES IN EFFECTIVELY SERVING UNDOCUMENTED CALIFORNIA COMMUNITY COLLEGE STUDENTS

1. Inadequate ability to outreach to undocumented students and protect student data
2. Insufficient institutional support/campus wide training
3. Need for dedicated stakeholders, staff, and space at each campus
4. Need for better access to financial support
5. Need for increased student engagement and direct services to increase student retention
6. Need for definitive guidance from CCC Chancellor's Office

Dreamers & DACA

In California, 242,339 young people have received DACA status between 2012 and March, 2017, according to the [Migration Policy Institute](#). Officials estimate that 72,300 undocumented students are enrolled at the state's public colleges and universities (70,000 at community colleges, 9,500 at Cal State and 4,000 at UC) and that half probably have DACA protection now. Nationwide, about 800,000 young people have received DACA status
